Remembering Heroes Fall Festival Set For September 24, 2022 at City Center

When her youngest son was killed serving in Iraq on July 24, 2003, Cathy Heighter's world was turned upside down. His death also set her on a new course she would never have imagined possible.

She quickly became one of the nation's most active and most effective advocates for veterans — including meeting twice with President George



W. Bush to lobby for changes to what she said she couldn't believe were the "shockingly low" death benefit the families of military members killed on active duty received.

At the time when her 22-year-old son, U.S. Army Corporal Raheen Tyson Heighter, died the death benefit of \$10,000 just barely covered the \$9,333 price tag of his funeral services.

"Something had to be done about this," Heighter said.

"There is no reason our children should be going over to a foreign country to fight to protect our nation and make the ultimate sacrifice laying down their lives for their families to find out their life was only worth \$10.000."

Ultimately, Heighter saw passage by Congress and signage by Bush 43 of the federal Raheen Tyson Heighter Life Insurance for America's Troops Act in 2005 that mandated significant raises in the dollar amounts families are paid when a military member is killed on active duty.

Today, her efforts are focused on helping veterans in Palm Coast and Flagler/Volusia counties get connected with resources and support in her role as co-founder and executive director of the Palm Coast based Remembering Vets.

On Saturday, September 24, the community is invited to a full day of honoring and remembering heroes of all types at a Remembering Vets sponsored event at the Palm Coast Town Center at 800 Belle Terre Parkway. The event is scheduled for 10 am. To 6 p.m. In a follow-up article that will be

published in the September issue of this magazine, more details will be released about the attractions that will be presented that day.

"We are going to be honoring veterans and first responders and Gold Star families (families who have a member that died on active duty)," Heighter said. But this year, the annual event is expanding. "We are also honoring local community heroes that stepped up to the plate and above and beyond and way out of their way during this COVID-19 pandemic. From food service industry workers and health care workers, we want to honor them and make sure they know how valued they are."

Quilts of honor are slated to be presented to various heroes, she said.

The event features a plethora of food trucks, the presence

of fire and police personnel and equipment and a game area organized for kids are all planned.

Yes, her efforts were initially inspired by the shocking death of her son. He remains a key motivating factor. But for Heighter, her work supporting veterans and their families goes well beyond merely a personal quest.

"This has given my son's life and death more meaning," Heighter said. "But what I want the community to understand is that we should never forget the sacrifices that these brave young men and women have made for our freedoms and we need to honor and understand that we owe them a debt we can never repay."

Three Palm Coast Schools Earn an "A" from DOE

Three schools in Flagler County received an "A" grade for the 2021-2022 school year from the Florida Department of Education when grades were released on July 7.

Old Kings Elementary, Belle Terre Elementary and Indian Trails Middle School are the three Palm Coast schools that received an "A" grade.

According to the release the schools statewide "exceeded expectations" in the 2021-2022 academic year, which marks the first full school grade data release since 2019. Grades were not assessed for the 2019-2020 year due to the COVID-19 pandemic, and schools were given the choice to opt-in to be graded for 2020-2021.

The state reported that 100% of schools in Florida graded "F" in 2019 improved their grades

in 2022, and that overall, elementary schools had the largest increase in the percentage of schools increasing their grade with 20%, or 351, improving by one or more letter grade.

In Flagler County, grades remained the same for the majority of schools between 2022 and 2021. No school opted in to be assessed in the 2020-2021 school year.

Two schools saw their grades decrease by a letter grade: Rymfire Elementary School went from a "B" in 2019 to a "C" in 2022, and Flagler Palm Coast High School's grade fell from a "B" in 2019 to a "C" in 2022. Old Kings Elementary School was the only one in the district to improve by a letter grade, going from a "B" in 2019 to an "A" in 2022.

The school district grade for Flagler County did drop to a "B" in 2022 from 2019, when it earned an "A."

In a news release by Flagler Schools, the district expressed that it has "areas of celebration and areas to build upon as we prepare for the upcoming school year."

"I am proud of the effort put forth by our school-based administrators, teachers, staff, students, and parents during this past school year. We will take the next few weeks to take a deep dive into the numbers," said Flagler Schools Superintendent Cathy Mittelstadt. "We recognize there are areas for targeted improvements, but I know our teachers, students, and school administrators are already preparing to address this in the upcoming school year."

On a statewide level, DOE was optimistic about the results, which also showed that 84% of schools graded "D" and "F" in 2019 improved their grades in 2022. In addition, the district reported that 469 schools increased their grade in 2022, while 825 schools maintained an "A" grade and 348 schools maintained a "B" grade compared to 2019.

"When I reflect on these school grades and the recent test results, the significant student growth, achievement gap closure and school-wide achievements validate Florida's approach to get our schools open first and return to normalcy as quickly as possible," said State Board of Education Chair Tom Grady in the news release.

New Ballot Tracking Service Comes to Flagler Elections

The Flagler County Supervisor of Elections is offering a new ballot tracking service for voters who choose to cast their ballot by mail.

Beginning with the 2022 Primary Election, the Flagler County Supervisor of Elections office will use BallotTrax, a secure communication system to help voters track their Vote-By-Mail ballots. BallotTrax has the capability to send text, email, and voicemail notifications reporting the status of a voter's ballot during an election. More than 500 counties across the country have used BallotTrax to allow voters to track the status of their mail ballots. Flagler County voters can sign up by visiting: www.FlaglerElections.gov/trax

The system does not change or update voter registration. It uses information available from the USPS to track outgoing and

received mail, and voter registration information that is made available via public record.

"This tracking service will help our voters who vote by mail, giving them confidence that their ballot has been received and counted by our office," stated Kaiti Lenhart, Supervisor of Elections.

Voters who don't use the new BallotTrax system will still be able to view their ballot status via the Elections Office website at: www.FlaglerElections.gov/VBM

Continuing her husband's legacy

Meet Teresa Rizzo, the new executive director of the Flagler County Education Foundation.

It's not a position she wanted less than six months ago.

She was busy as a literacy director with the state department of education after many years in the classroom. She was happy supporting the education foundation as the wife of its executive director volunteering alongside her husband working on carrying out a mission that they both shared to improve the educational outcomes for Flagler County's children. But after her husband, Joe Rizzo, died unexpectedly earlier in 2022, she knew it was a position she should apply to fulfill.

"I thought through all of the things becoming the executive director would mean. I thought about what it would feel like taking over, stepping into his shoes and how big and impactful those shoes were," Teresa told the Palm Coast Magazine. "I knew that this was a labor of love."

In the five years since he became director, Joe had taken the organization founded in 1990 from identifying a plethora of needs to be met to an organization with varied and wide-reaching programs supporting education in Flagler County with a more than \$760,000 annual budget.

"Joe was the most fearless person I have ever known," Teresa said. "He was never scared to ask. When I feel myself starting to be 'overly cautious' about asking for help on behalf the county's children, I always remember he would say that the worst thing someone can tell him is no and that before he asked for the help, that was where he was anyway."

Admittedly, Teresa said, she and Joe are very different people.

"The staff here tell me that Joe was what the organization need for the past five years to get to the level it is at. Now, they tell me it needs you to put those plans in place so that it can be sustained. It was amazing how he could just shoot from the hip and make amazing, amazing things happen. Now it is time for adding systematic plans."

Teresa said she is a more systematic type of leader than her husband was.

"I like having a plan," she said. "I believe the foundation needs to have a strategic plan now to continue and grow its work."

Not that her influence hasn't already been a big part of her husband's work.

"Our pillow talk often was about what teachers needed in classrooms," Teresa shared noting that while Joe served as executive director, she was the one in the trenches seeing what was happening in school. "We would share ideas and collaborate back and forth and talk about what teachers and students were really struggling with at the school level where the work is done."

Even though their leadership styles varied, Joe and Teresa shared many things including







both having a degree in education from Mars Hill University, a private faith-based college in Mars Hill, North Carolina, which is located in the greater Asheville, North Carolina, area. One of their children now attends Mars Hill playing golf for the university.

They also shared a passion to help kids. That joint passion is what Teresa said keeps her going now that she is without her partner.

"I don't have him to bounce

things off of now," Teresa said. "But for Joe and I, kids were always our passion. We wanted to make sure we were supplying students with those fundamental things that they didn't have before. It was so fulfilling for the two of us and I know it will continue to be that as I carry on."

Finances are tight for foster families.

That's why a Palm Coast based group of pirates star in murder mystery shows and participate in a bunch of other fundraisers.

They are called the Seawolf Privateers and they are 40 members strong in less than a year of existence.


"We just want to help 'foster' some bonds between all the kids living in a foster family," Cayti Brinegar, a member of the group, told Palm Coast Magazine. "We want to include everyone — the foster kids, the biological children in the family and the parents or guardians — to spend time together just having fun and making memories together."

Trouble is that goal isn't

easily achieved for foster families. At least not from an economic perspective.

"Just the expense a foster family faces in trying to plan an outing for the entire family is many times too much," Brinegar said.

That's why the Seawolf Privateers are doing a "fun day" for foster families this month. On tap are of course, appearances by the members of the group dressed in their appropriate garb, plus appearances by members of the Sirens, a St. Augustine based mermaid group. Bounce houses, face painting, treasure hunt, a magic show, carnival games and of course food and shaved ice to help beat the heat. Every child also receives pirate-themed souvenirs, Brinegar said.







Brinegar said social service agencies that assist foster families throughout the year are encouraged to set up a booth as well. The Privateers want the event to not only provide foster families with a memorable experience, but also provide a "onestop shopping" opportunity for foster families to sign up for the varied programs available to help meet their needs.

"Instead of having to run around to all these different agencies, we hope that having the agencies present there will help reduce the amount of effort and stress families have to go through to get the assistance they need," Brinegar said.

The entire event is free to foster families and Brinegar estimates the event will cost a total of \$6,000. Much of that has been raised via two murder mystery shows in July.

The group still seeks help from the community — particularly from businesses that can donate food or drink items or take home items for the children in attendance, she said.

Weight gain as we age isn't inevitable

It seems to be almost a fact of life that as we get older we also get heavier. Why does this happen? And is there anything that can prevent it? Neither of these questions has a simple answer but here are some factors that have traditionally affected this phenomenon.

One of the biggest factors that influences weight gain is our metabolism. When we're young it's high. As we get older, usually around our mid-20s, it slows down which means that we burn calories at a slower rate. There's nothing anyone can do about this as it's part of normal human development.

Another big factor, unsurprisingly, is the rate at which we consume calories. Obviously, the more calories that you consume, the more you have to burn off and if you don't burn off those calories then you're going to gain weight. It's really as simple as that.

There's another factor that may be affecting weight gain as people get older and that's the loss of sensory stimulation from physical sources. Quite simply, as people get older and have sex less frequently there's plenty of evidence to suggest that substituting food for sex is something that many people do to compensate for receiving less physical satisfaction than during their more sexually active years.

The fact that eating is an important source of sensory stimulation was driven home to me the first time I fasted. I lived on protein pills and apple juice for 15 days and could have done so for a lot longer (I think) except for the fact that the loss of sensory stimulation from tasting food became a real problem.

When I finally did start eating again the flavors were, seemingly at least, more powerful or concentrated or something that I definitely noticed as being different. What I think happened was just that I really missed the simple sensation of eating and tasting flavors which is a powerful sensory experience.

And researchers hacve found that the brain treats food and sex in many similar ways so there is some scientific evidence of a direct correlation between having less sex and feeling like eating more. So maybe having sex more to help control your appetite will work or maybe it won't, but surely there's no downside to trying this.

So what can we influence in our quest to keep off weight otherwise? Since our bodies store excess calories as fat, the most obvious way to keep your weight down is to consume less calories. Eat less, in other words. Easier said than done, obviously, but it's the first step to take.

One of the best ways to make money, it seems, is to come up with a new diet plan for people who haven't been able to lose weight. Most of these are fads and are ineffective, of course, because if anyone ever came up with a plan that actually worked for people then everybody that wanted to lose weight would already be following it.

And there is also, I think, a real misconception of what it takes to actually lose weight and keep it off. The greatest development in the last decade or so for people who want to watch their weight has been the introduction of nutrition labels on food and calorie counts on restaurant menus. You can now easily calculate the number of calories that you consume every day.

It's very easy to see how many calories you consume

and then it's easy to gradually find out how many calories you actually need each day. Everybody's different but most adults need about 2,000-2,500 per day to maintain their weight. Consume less than that amount and you lose weight; consume more than that and you'll gain.

First, get a scale and weigh yourself every day. Every day. Then track your caloric intake

every day. Gradually you'll see the direct correlation between what you're eating and how it affects your weight.

You will gradually find out how many calories you need to consume every day until you lose what you want. And here's a reason that people have a hard time committing to a diet in the first place — the thought of not being able to eat food that you love in order to lose weight. Here's the reality.

First, when you're at the weight you want, you don't need to eat less than your optimal daily calorie count. If you don't need to lose weight then eat as many calories a day as you can without going over your optimal amount (2,000-2,500). You can eat a cheese-burger whenever you want, for

example, as long as your calorie count for the day is okay.

This may seem like a pain in the butt at first since it requires a bit more planning than usual. But, the more you count calories the easier it gets and eventually you'll know what you can eat and how much of it, based on your experience.

In the beginning you might want to write down everything you eat and then calculate the

number of calories you consumed. That's an easy way to keep track. And it's easy to find out how many calories anything has. Just Google it.

The other side of the equation to eating sensibly is exercising in some way. I've spent most of the last 45 years running and working out, usually five or six days a week.

This is probably more than most people have the time for

if they are of working age and have families, commitments, etc. I would argue that there is nothing more important than staying as healthy as you can, however the reality is that most people aren't going to have the time or inclination to be as dedicated as I am in this regard.

But that's okay. In my next column I'm going to show some ways to work out that don't take a lot of time and are enough to keep you active and burning calories without exhausting you.

With a sensible exercise plan that you can maintain to complement your healthy eating, you should hit your target weight eventually and, more importantly, stay there.



What should a home inspection cover by Darrell Algarin

Home inspection is a vital part of the home buying and selling process. It can help home sellers prepare their home for sale and home buyers avoid expensive repairs later. A home inspector will examine the following components of the home where accessible and safe to do so:

Structure – The inspector will examine the foundation of the home and the overall construction. This includes checking if siding appears loose or damaged, if the windows and doors function as expected, if screens are present and in good condition, if any thresholds are loose, and if there is any rot.

Exterior – An exterior inspection covers the roof, gutter system, and crawlspaces. It will also check surrounding landscape such as walkways, driveways, steps, decks, fencing and patios, and whether the landscape allows for proper drainage.

Interior – This part of the inspection covers everything from the chimney to skylights to the attic, basement, and walls, floors, and ceilings. Your inspector will point out any issues they find and include them in the home inspection report. Common issues include water damage, loose plaster, damaged fixtures, cracks, and more.

Electrical – Your inspector will check electrical components including light fixtures, electrical outlets, and major appliances. They will also check the HVAC unit for proper function.

Plumbing – Finally the home inspections covers bathroom and kitchen fixtures as well as the home's water heating system.

What to Expect

It is extremely rare that any house, even a newly built one, is 100% issue-free. It is vital to find a reliable home inspector who will provide a thorough home inspection, which will help identify issues and answer questions. Your trusted home inspector will also be able to

provide suggestions for next steps, such as how to identify issues with leaky roofs.

How to Find a Good Home Inspector

HAPP BIRTHDAY OUT OF THE STATE OF THE STATE

It's hard to belove that one year has passed since the first issue of Palm Coast magazine was published. And in that year, the magazine has changed in many ways, mostly notably in the number of pages, but also in a number of other ways as we have learned from and adjusted to the market conditions that are peculiar to Palm Coast itself.

When we published the first issue of Palm Coast we weren't sure of what would exactly it was that would interest readers here. It took us several issues but we came up with a theme for the magazine that has provided us with a blueprint for publishing the magazine for now and in the future.

It's nothing radical. We just decided that the only information that we would publish in the magazine would have to be focused on Palm Coast and only Palm Coast. Seems rather self-obvious now but in the beginning we were interested in putting together a package of information that would entertain and inform our readers just like we did for any of the previous 11 magazines we've published over the years.

However, the current market reality is that publications with a broad-based variety of topics are the publications that are dying the fastest in the internet age. Think daily newspapers. They're the genre of publications that has been hurt the

most by the internet, both editorially and advertising.

If I'm a sports fan, for example, is it easier for me to read a daily newspaper for the information I want or simply go to the ESPN website or the Sports Illustrated website, or a half a dozen others to read exclusively about sports?

So we went back to one of the first things we were taught in journalism school many years ago: people are most interested in hearing about what's happening in their own backyard. So that's the guiding philosophy of Palm Coast magazine. It's gotta be about Palm Coast to make it into the magazine.



You see the problem for a newspaper. And on top of that, Craigslist took most of the classified advertising revenue from newspapers which was always their bread and butter as far as income went. This was a serious blow to their bottom lines and helped precipitate the rapid decline of the newspaper industry in general. In fact, there's a website called newspaperdeathwatch.com which has tracked newspaper closures in the U.S. for a number of years now.

To take this a step further, in terms of what is happening in the publishing industry nowadays, it seemed to us that the only publications that are thriving in the current environment are ones that have a small, well-defined niche.

For example, Palm Coast and what's happening here, is our editorial niche and our readers pick up the magazine because they want to know what's happening around them on a regular basis.

And, if you wanted to find the

information that is included in every issue of Palm Coast you might be able to find some of it on websites but it wouldn't be easy and some of what we publish you would never find anywhere.

We can't think of any medium that provides the type of information that we do.

And if you add to this the fact that people can't get this information anywhere else then you have all of the ingredients you need for a successful magazine.

So that's our story and we're sticking to it. We'd like to thank everyone who has made this so-journ of ours so interesting and even fun so far. We're committed to continuing to publish the best package of information we can for our readers and we look forward to many more years of publishing that are as rewarding and exciting as this first one has been.

Bronx House Pizza Serves Up A Bit Of New York



New Yorkers have for a long time considered good pizza almost a birthright it seems, as though they actually invented pizza, at least pizza in the U.S. And they may have, according to some sources. Other sources think that the first pizza place was in Boston in 1904, with New Yorkers laying claim to

the opening of Lombardi's in 1905. Boston and New York fighting over something — what a surprise.

Wherever pizza-making actually started, outside of Italy of course which has records of pizza dating back over a thousand years, New Yorkers have a special thing for pizza.

That can be attested to by the number of New York style pizza places we have

here in Palm Coast as well as countless other places around the country. What sets New York pizzas apart from others?

Well, first of all, it's mostly the crust in our opinion. It's thin and supposed to be on the crisp side as opposed to many other styles, especially ones

from Chicago, that are thicker to varying degrees.

Personally, we prefer thin crusts so during a two-year stint in Chicago in the mid-80s we didn't eat much pizza. And there are many other varieties available too in cities all over the U.S. We found almost 20 distinctive types that have evolved over the years into regional specialties.

Our latest visit to a local pizza parlor took place at Bronx House Pizza on Route 100 in a strip mall next to the airport. With a name like this they're obviously selling New York style pizzas and they also have a small menu of Italian dishes to complement the pizza choic-

the dishes so we opted for a 10" pizza, their smallest size, and put some pepperoni, meatballs and peppers on it. We also ordered an appetizer portion of meatballs, the Chicken Milanese and the Eggplant Parmesan.

All of the prices were reasonable and the overall food quality is good. Growing up eating Sicilian food, we've been making meatballs for over 40 vears and the ones here are pretty good, a lot better than most and almost as good as my great-grandmother's recipe which came from Sicily (according to family legend) to Boston in 1905.

And the marinara sauce is

of equally high quality, being a little lighter than ours but with plenty of tomato flavor. It seems to have been cooked slightly less than our marinara, which is heavier with a denser, more complex flavor. The Bronx's sauce has a slightly fresher taste and, as mentioned, is a bit lighter. It's certainly better than many we've tried over the years.

The entrees we tried were also done well, which is not surprising because with a good sauce all of your food has a





built-in advantage from the start. And the portion sizes here are generous: the dish containing the Eggplant Parmesan, for example, could have easily housed a roast turkey.

A few beers and wines are available along with the soft drinks and the cannolis for dessert looked great, although we were too stuffed by then.

We dined in but all of their food is also available to go. The style of the pizza you're eating may be important but so are the ingredients and the preparation and here they have it all together.

He does buy a lot of flat sheet stainless steel. It works well to cut out fish shapes, he said.


Home Sweet Palm Coast Home

a hair salon in Bethesda, Maryland.

"So, after having a crazy night drinking too much gin, I thought, what about Florida. A friend said to me, 'go to Palm Coast in Florida.' So, we had two days left on our trip then and so we went. After kicking the tires a bit and acting like peeping toms checking out

houses on our own, we said we need to get a realtor. We looked at 20 houses and the last one we saw is the one we bought."

He welcomes visitors to his garage gallery. One just must catch up with him on his website to set an appointment.

For now, probably for the rest of his metal-cutting life, Wallace's artwork is a diversion to occupy his retirement.




