

## Palm Coast Senior Games Coming September 15

The City of Palm Coast is gearing up for the return of one of its most exciting annual events this September, the 2023 Senior Games. The event, which begins on September 15, is open to participants ages 50 and up. This year, the city will welcome back mainstay events golf, pickleball and tennis, while adding a number of new events over the course of the new robust schedule, which will see billiards, bowling, horseshoes, shuffleboard, bocce, basketball free throw, bag toss, darts, surfing and even a 5K road race competition all making their Palm Coast Senior Games debut this year.

"It goes without saying that the Senior Games is something that our Parks and Recreation staff look forward to just as much as our participants each year," said James Hirst, Director of Parks and Recreation for the City of Palm Coast. "Having the ability to bring these new events into the fold this year means that more of our residents will be able to get involved, bring out their competitive spirit and see what makes this event truly special."

This year, the Senior Games will take place from September 15- October 8 at various locations throughout the city. Event schedules are as follows: Tennis, September 15-17 from 8am-4pm, Palm Coast Tennis Center Billiards, September 19 from 2pm-6pm, Cue Note Billiards Bowling, September 21, 11:30am-2pm, Palm Coast Lanes, Pickleball, September 22-24, 9am-4pm, Holland Park, Golf, September 23, 8am-3pm, Palm Harbor Golf Club, Horseshoes, Shuffleboard, Bocce, Basketball, and Bag Toss, September 25 from 9am-4pm, Holland Park, Darts, September 29 from 5pm-8pm, Palm Coast Community Center, Surfing, September 30 from 10am-2pm, Jubbah Beach, 5K Road Race, October 8 at 7:45am, AdventHealth Palm Coast

## Veteran's Award Nominations Are Now Being Accepted

Flagler County's Veterans Services Office is asking for nominations for its "Colonel Gary E. DeKay" Veteran of the



Year Award, which will be presented on Veterans Day.

The award will be presented to a living Flagler County veteran who has not only served the United States with honor but has used the leadership skills and abilities learned in the military to improve the Flagler County community through

selfless volunteer service.

"We have more than 13,000 veterans in Flagler County and they have done so much for all of us," said Veterans Services Officer David Lydon. "This

award gives us an opportunity to say thank you as a community."

Nominations will be accepted now through September 30. The Flagler County Veterans Advisory Council commissions a panel of veterans and community leaders to review and select the Veteran of the Year from the eligible candidates.

The following criteria must be met for an individual to be considered for the Flagler County "Colonel Gary E. DeKay" Veteran of the Year:

• Must be a resident of Flagler County.

• Must be a living veteran of one of the six Armed Forces of the United States, including Reserve or National Guard, or the United States Merchant Marine.

• Must have demonstrated outstanding patriotism, leadership, and selfless service as a veteran and as a volunteer in community or civic service.

• May be awarded for a single act or for continuous service.

• May not be a previous recipient of the Flagler County Veteran of the Year award.

Nominations must be postmarked no later than September 30 and may not exceed three typewritten pages. There are other qualifications that must be met so for more information about these and any other details, please call Dave Lydon at 386-313-4042.

## **Matanzas High Expansion Started**

A planned \$18 million expansion project at Matanzas High School is underway after a ceremonial groundbreaking that was held July 24 on the school campus at 3535 Pirate Nation Way in Palm Coast.

Donning hardhats and shovels, Interim Superintendent LaShakia Moore joined MHS principal Kristin Bozeman, Flagler County School Board Members Cheryl Massaro, Christy Chong, Will Furry, and Sally Hunt, as well as Flagler Schools Chief of Operational



Services Dave Freeman, and Director of Plant Services Kory Bush in turning the first shovel of dirt.

Interim Superintendent Moore says, "This project has taken so much planning. We've talked about this for so long that seeing the work begin is exciting. This brings life to the renderings we've looked at over the past year."

Kristin Bozeman adds, "This expansion is setting up Matanzas for future growth as we continue to see rooftops rise all around our campus. We may have to deal with a few challenges with having a construction zone in the middle of your campus, but in the end, our students, faculty, and staff will have a campus design that will better fit our needs."

The project will add or renovate more than 31,000 square



feet to the campus. The largest portion is a 20,000-squarefoot classroom addition. But there will also be a larger media center, expanded cafeteria space, and a new central energy plant. In addition, a new pre-engineered metal building will support the school's physical education programs. Classes will be conducted normally, and work will be phased in as needed to minimize interruptions. Final completion is anticipated to be July 2025.

Funding for this project comes from impact fees collected from new home construction across the county.

## **QR** Code Use Rapidly Growing in Popularity

You've undoubtedly seen QR codes all over the place in your everyday life and you maybe a regular user of them. If you are, you may not need to read this article. If you're not that familiar with them and aren't sure of what they do, then please read on.

In either case, QR codes are here to stay and are gaining in popularity and usage. We have been using them in this magazine for over a year now and they have been steadily producing more and more scans each issue. In the last 90 days,

for example, the number of scans made from QR codes in our pages has gone up 174% in the last 90 days.

How do you scan a QR code? Now you can simply point most phones at a code such as the one at right and the phone will display a URL. When you touch that URL you are taken to a web page. When I first started using QR codes I downloaded a QR code reader from the Google Play Store. iPhone users that have an iPhone 11 or later can automatically scan codes without a QR reader. My current Samsung phone, an A13, also automatically scans QR codes so I don't have to use the QR reader software that I downloaded for free over a year ago.



So if your phone doesn't scan codes automatically just download one of the free apps and vou'll be all set.

If you want to see if your phone can scan codes then trv scanning the code on this page. If it works you'll be taken to our web page where you can download any of our back issues. And if you have any guestions for any reason just do a Google search and you'll find lots of information to help you. In the meantime, please keep reading... and scanning.

#### Greg Hansen's "retirement" in Palm Coast, by Rachel Dolezal

Greg Hansen originally moved to Palm Coast to retire, but instead he is spending his time serving as the Flagler County Commission Chairman and using his extensive background in government relations to help make Flagler County a great place to live, work and play.

Hansen was born in Wisconsin, but raised in San Antonio, Texas. He graduated from the United States Naval Academy in 1969. After graduation, he served 27 years in the Navy and retired as a Captain. Throughout his time in the Navy, Hansen served a year in Vietnam and commanded two Naval Warships, the USS McClusky (FFG-41) and the USS Antietam (CG-54).

After retiring from the Navy,

Hansen worked for a government relations firm in Washington, D.C., helping companies supply products to the Navy.

Hansen and his wife, Linda, moved to Palm Coast in 2005, when he retired. The couple was eyeing locations up and down the East Coast when one of his colleges mentioned Palm Coast.

In January of 2017, Hansen was appointed to the Flagler County Board of Commissioners by Gov. Rick Scott and served as an appointee for two years. He was then re-elected to the post twice by a landslide.

During his tenure as District 2 Commissioner, Hansen has been a part of several successful community projects, served on various committees and has helped manage future development of the County.

"I am very proud of my role in managing future development," Hansen said. "You can't stop development, but you can manage it."

He has also helped establish good relationships with the cities and county.

"Good relationships with the city and county are important because we all have to sing from the same sheet of music," Hansen said. "We all have to have the same goals. That's the way we can succeed as a county."

Hansen and the Board of





Commissioners have been working to replenish the Flagler County beaches that were battered by hurricanes in the past years. After hurricane Matthew in 2016, they commissioned a massive emergency replenishment of sand and added sea walls in Flagler Beach.

"We all have to have the same goals. That's the way we can succeed as a county."

In spring of 2024, they expect to begin a project with the Army Corp of Engineers to complete dredging 2.6 miles off the shore of Flagler Beach. The goal is to protect State Road A1A and improve the beaches. The board is also working on a plan to replenish beaches north of

Flagler Beach to the St. Johns County line. They hope to keep dredging and replenishing sand as far north as Jungle Hut Rd.

Hansen currently serves on the Board of Directors for the Florida Agricultural Museum, on the Community Redevelopment Agency Committee for Marineland and is chair of the Flagler County Value Adjustment Board.

As a County Commissioner, Hansen fights every year to keep taxes low and closely guards the tax-payer dollar.

"Every year we fight the battle of 'don't raise the taxes,' and, in fact, we cut it," said Hansen.

He credits his staff for providing the board with a sound budget plan that they review very closely to evaluate needs verses wants.

"Every year we seem to come out just right," said Hansen. "But there is never enough money to do everything you want."





The Flagler settlers who lived here for decades, if not centuries, watched as some 42,000 acres of pine forests, home to wildlife and human entrepreneurship, were cut down. Original streams and rivers were altered to accommodate canal homes. Unknown historic treasures were forever lost and turned over into deeper ground to hide what should have never been disturbed.

The first decade of Palm Coast was naturally a first for many things. Many celebrities visited Palm Coast and the news hype was high. But the most important feature of the decade was the people moving here and beginning a new life. The Civic Association and Volunteer Fire department were started. The first store (Handyway 73) and church (St. Mark by the Sea 76) would be built. Dr. Dunn and Dr. George Ledger were the first doctors and PCHS Board member, Greg Johnston (76) was the first dentist. Businesses opened and a community began to develop into a city.

# Palm Coast's Medical Options Double With New Hospital

#### **By TOM AIKINS**

The latest medical facility to call Palm Coast home will open on August 3, 2023, just about the same time this magazine will be hitting the streets. Offeet, AdventHealth Palm Coast Parkway has 100 beds, effectively doubling the inpatient capacity in Flagler County and nearly doubling the ar-



ficially known as AdventHealth Palm Coast Parkway, the hospital is the largest investment ever in the medical field in Flagler County, carrying a \$167 million price tag.

The four-story building is located off Palm Coast Parkway, abutting Bridgehaven Drive on the opposite side of town from the location of its first Palm Coast hospital at 60 Memorial Medical Parkway. ea's emergency department services. The hospital also includes state-of-the-art surgical suites, cardiac catheterization labs for heart-related conditions, endoscopy suites for digestive health issues and more.

Complementing the hospital is a 30,000-square-foot medical office building that opened on June 12. The medical office building on the campus of AdventHealth Palm Coast Parkway houses a range of specialized services, including orthopedics, cardiology, gastrointestinal, surgical, urology, and gynecology care.

"As a long-time Flagler County resident myself, I am personally thrilled to see this new hospital open," said Wally De Aquino, president/CEO for AdventHealth Palm Coast Parkway (see below) and an area resident since 2005. "Construction began in September 2021, but the planning and preparation were years in the making. Flagler County - and Palm Coast in particular – has experienced significant growth in recent years, and to help keep our community healthy, it is important that our health care infrastructure continues to expand and grow too."

Palm Coast has a predominantly older population and even though families are moving here, retirees still dominate the scene. With aging comes greater health troubles including a significant increase in the possibility of experiencing a heart attack or a cardio vascular failure.

Fortunately, a big part of the expansion of health services

in Palm Coast is centered on heart health. AdventHealth pretty much leads the way for heart care in Palm Coast offering care and specialists for acute and chronic conditions including atrial fibrillation and arrhythmia.

As well as the obvious benefits a new hospital brings in terms of medical capabilities for the community there is also an important economic factor that is present. Initially, the hospital will have about 350 employees which is a big contribution to the city's economy since many of these jobs are higher-paying than retail or most service industry jobs.

And with the new hospital's presence here there will be more spinoff companies that provide services for hospitals and labs locating here, creating more jobs. This is part of the city's long-term plan involving a nexus of medical businesses that provide good jobs for the city.

In essence, the hospital provides more needed services and more income to the city which can only be looked at as a big positive for Palm Coast.

Spanning 158,000 square-

Key projects and initiatives under De Aquino's direction: include transitioning OP Rehab from PT Solutions to an in-house department aligning the culture and resulting in a \$250K expense reduction, partnering with the City of Palm Coast to recruit University of North Florida and Jacksonville University to build a new campus in Palm Coast, building a simulation lab to serve team members of Central Florida Division-North and students from University of North Florida and Jacksonville University, negotiating and establishing a partnership with Flagler County Schools that included a focus on sports, ca-



reers and mental health, leading the planning and construction of a new \$167 million campus comprised of a 100 beds hospital and a 30,000 square foot medical office building, overseeing the planning of a new cancer center, serving as the AdventHealth Palm Coast executive sponsor for the EPIC implementation, leading a major renovation of a \$5 million OR and ambulatory surgery center, and developing a partnership with the Hammock Dunes community to expand rehabilitation services.














#### Incredible, edible alliums — onions and garlic, by Fran Corcoran, Judy Jean

When my children were small, we read a book together called "A Tale of Tulips, A Tale of Onions" written by David Francis Birchman. The story is based on the tulipomania craze (1634-1637) in Holland, when the Mosaic virus infected tulip bulbs.

Flowers grown from the infected bulbs had "bizarre" stripes or flames. Tulip bulbs became more and more valuable, then plummeted sharply. In the end, a tulip bulb was no more valuable than a common onion.

More recently I ran across an article on re-growing vegetables from kitchen scraps that piqued my interest. Anyone that cooks with garlic has probably experienced cloves that sprout before they can be used. Although not recommended with cloves from the grocery (they may be treated and unlikely to grow well) cloves are used to propagate and grow new garlic bulbs or garlic sprouts.

Likewise, onion bulbs are used to grow new onions or onion greens. If a whole spring onion is not used, and the lighter bottom part is placed in water (photo below) or potting soil the dark green leaves will re-grow. This will also work with a common onion (photo below). All you need is a sunny windowsill.

Onions and garlic have been cultivated for centuries. There are indications in Egyptian cemeteries that date back to as early as 3750 BC, and references that date back to the time of the Pharaohs (starting around 2500 BC). Garlic and onions make appearances in many places including poems, stories, books, recipes, quotes, medical texts and journals. Most, but certainly not all historical or current references are positive. These "smelly" vegetables definitely arouse strong opinions. Podcast searches using "onion" or "garlic" pulled more results than I expected. Of course, most are not actually about the edible allium vegetables, but the search results reflect just how deeply ingrained these "smelly



vegetables" are in popular culture.

There are podcasts titled "The Friendship Onion," "Needs Garlic!," "Peel Back the Onion," "The Garlic Girls" and "The ONION Peel." Embedded in the description for the latter podcast is "...how much life is like an onion; it stinks and makes us cry, but the flavor it brings is priceless."

The exceptional flavor these two aromatic vegetables deliver is acknowledged around the world, as reflected in the Flavor Bases of many different world cuisines such as Cajun, Indian, French, Middle Eastern, and Latin to name just a few. Onions and garlic are indispensable in the kitchen.

There are many types of onions and garlic. Grocery stores will generally offer the longest storing variety, called silverskins. For home gardeners it is best to purchase seeds (onions), sets, or seedlings for planting from a reputable seller. Once they are growing in the garden, some can also be propagated by division.

Onions and garlic are fairly easy to grow, as long as cultural practices are observed. Choose only healthy bulbs/cloves or



plants, plant in light soils enriched with well-rotted manure and with good drainage, provide a sunny location and consistent irrigation, and keep the bed weeded. Crop rotation is also important to maintain a disease-free site. Onions and garlic are low-calorie flavor-boosters. They provide vitamin C, vitamin B6, potassium & folate. Garlic also has thiamine, calcium, phosphorous, copper and manganese.

And, the great flavors, either strong or delicate, that garlic and onions add to so many dishes is a powerful motivation to keep growing them.

#### Southside Grille offers an interesting dining experience

Bunnell is not really known for having a sophisticated dining scene but there are enough little mom-and-pop type places there to make it rather interesting in its own right, however. We visited one of those interesting places to find out if the accounts we had read were true and we were pleasantly surprised by what we found,

We were expecting a diner sort of place judging by what we had seen but they were advertising a prime rib special over the weekend. That didn't add up completely since we had never seen a diner serve prime rib before. And the hours weren't a diner's either since they didn't open until 11 AM.

It does look a bit like diner on the inside but that's where it seems to end as the menu offers too many higher-end items for that thought to remain in your head for long regardless of the wall decorations and



counter seating that are featured.

It's an unpretentious but comfortable looking interior and the large menu seems to echo this theme as well. There are a mixture of old favorites as well as some items that you maybe wouldn't expect. — like prime rib. We tried it, by the way, and it was quite good and at a price, \$22, that will almost certainly bring people back.

We also tried the ribs and they were unlike any we've had since we moved to Florida as they were sauced but then they were also put back on the fire to carmelize and even char the sugar in the sauce a bit, creating a different flavor and crunchy texture which reminded me of some forms of



Chinese barbecue you can get in parts of Asia.

Anyway, they were very good, as was the burger we got, the prices were reasonable, and the service was fine. There's no reason not to check out this intriguing little place with its large menu that offers good value to its customers.

# Flagler Artists

#### Babz Lupoli is an educator turned artist, by James Moore

For the past twenty years, Babz Lupoli has been an artist. Shortly after moving to Florida, she attended an art fair to hand out brochures for Chicos, where she was working. Marveling at the art, she wondered aloud how it was possible to create such pieces. A stranger nearby suggested Babz look it up, reminding her that You-Tube and Google exist.

Babz, to this day, does not know who that woman was or has ever seen her again since. But the comment sent her on a journey through art classes and up to owning her own gallery.

If you had asked Babz, as a child, if she had any artistic interests, she might have laughed. The only painting she recalls being hung in her childhood home was a pastel piece from an artist on a street corner in New Orleans. Other than that, it was only posters adorning the walls of her childhood home. Babz's father was a sales agent and moved the family from the Midwest to the deep south and further to New York and Connecticut.

As an adult, Babz was a career educator. Thirty-two years





serving in the Baltimore Public Schools; eleven years teaching first grade, and the rest spent as an administrator. Without realizing it, Babz was mingling the people skills her father taught her as a salesperson and the creativity of a teacher.

Moving to Florida twenty-three years ago, Babz worked in advertisements, before moving to sales with Chicos. More of her creativity

was forming in her subconscious as she helped customers accessorize to form the perfect outfit. The serendipitous interaction with the mystery woman happened and Babz joined her first art class.

This began an entirely new and enveloping chapter for Babz. What started as a class became her life for the last twenty years. From the first moment of that class, painting sunsets, oceans, and sailboats, she knew she had the ability. Her experience as a teacher primed her mind to absorb the information quickly. It took a short while to realize she could do this professionally.

"I never had a bad day with art,"she says. "Any mistake you make, you can just paint over it."

Community was another major factor for Babz's new career as an artist. She had nine other classmates, and from the start they worked together supporting each other. Using this support, Babz went from joining the Daytona Art League to being a board member for fifteen years, acquiring several awards.

Forever the educator, Babz found herself back in the classroom, aiming to teach beginner art classes. There will always be the love of seeing a student latch onto the art the same way she did, but what also "keeps her going" is teaching new styles to experienced artists. Babz cultivates the same support she experienced from her classmates. One such way is an art program she founded with the Chiles Academy of Daytona, a charter school for pregnant teens and young parents to finish their education. "Art can take you into so many different areas," Babz says.

Babz is managing Galerie Elan in Daytona Beach, having previously led Beaux Arts of Central Florida in Melbourne. The website describes it as, "A delightfully eclectic co-operative gallery hosting over 75 artists, from emerging local talent to internationally known names," which host monthly art walks.


The first Friday of every month, it hosts a new exhibition. October 2023, the website advertises a collaboration with the Florida Women's Arts



Association. There are also options to register for classes to begin your own journey as Flagler's next artist.




