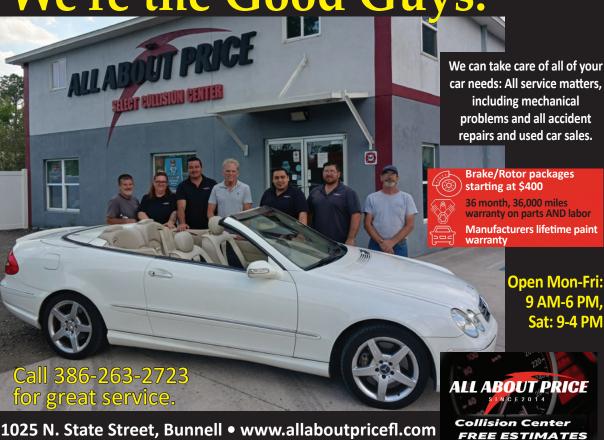

Sheriff Rick Staly Cites Flagler Crime Statistics In Report

Flagler County Sheriff Rick Staly had a lot of favorable statistics regarding crime in Flagler County when he made his seventh annual Addressing Crime Together Community Meeting recently. The most important revelation may have been the fact that the overall crime rate in the county has decreased by 54% since 2017, the year the sheriff took office.

Other favorable statistics include the fact that a Palm Coast survey found that 92% of residents felt safe. The survey also found that 81% felt very or somewhat safe about property crime and 84% felt safe from violent crime. Those are all great numbers but there was one number that wasn't great and that's the fact that residential burglaries in-creased in 2023 although they appear to be trending downwards this year. And all of this positive activity took place while at the same

time the population has been steadily growing and will continue to do so.

Homeowners should not be fearful of a break-in, he said, because that crime has centered mostly on homes un-der construction, in which someone might enter and steal lumber, for example, or commit vandalism, according to Staly. While some of the vandalism was done by juveniles, Staly reported that some adults who didn't want to see a new house on a nearby empty lot also committed vandalism.

"As I drive around the community, I can see that because people are out walking, bicycling, they're using our trails, and in areas where the community doesn't feel safe that doesn't happen," Staly said.

Staly, a Republican, is running for re-election this year and has so far drawn one candidate, Larry Jones, a Demo-

crat, whom Staly easily beat in 2020 when Staly received 70% of the vote to Jones' 30%. Staly also defeat-ed Jones in 2016 by 54% to 39% of the vote.

As far as other crimes are concerned, assault and battery is down 35% so far this year. Domestic violence in-creased in 2023, but is down 4% so far this year. Staly said the county has seen 16,000 new residents in the last three years, which may factor into the increase in domestic violence reported after the pandemic.

"Maybe they don't take domestic violence seriously where they came from, but they found out here that we do," Staly said.

Before the pandemic, domestic violence was trending downward. But when people who perhaps didn't have a great relationship to start with were forced to stay home in close quarters, it created more tension, he said. A relat-ed crime, stalking, is up 133%.

Staly warned people to not pursue others in former relationships and not to violate injunctions.

"Let the individual go. There's

33% of car breaks involved a broken window compared to 17% last year.

Staly said electric bicycles are becoming more of a target for thieves, usually at Publix and Walmart and out-side residences. He advised residents to chain up their e-bikes.

He said that shoplifting incidents are up about 80% as compared to last year, usually at big box stores, like Target and Walmart. He said that 73% of those occurred at self-checkouts by either skip-scanning, in which a person scans an item but skips others, or bar-code swapping.

Staly said a University of Florida study projects that Flagler County will have a population of 172,000 residents by 2035 — just 11 years away.

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, Flagler County had a population of 131,439 as of July 2023.

Staly said the agency is 37 deputies short to meet the needs of the community to handle calls for service, and that does not include the growth the community is seeing.

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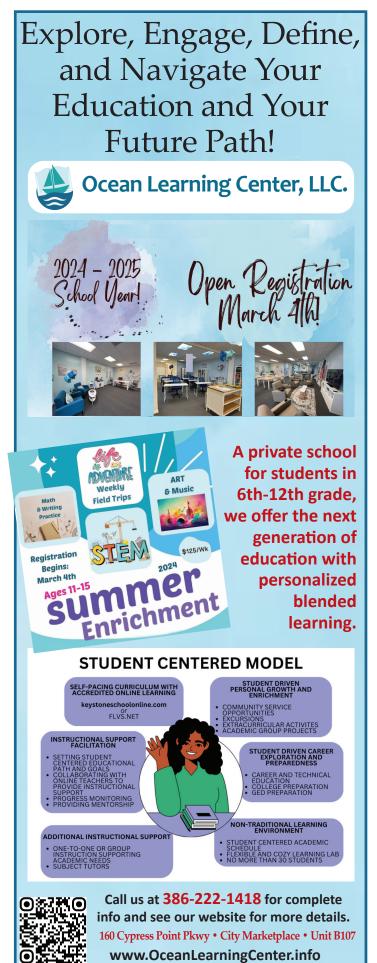

Ed Siarkowicz chronicles Flagler County history, by James Moore

Originally from New York City, Ed Siarkowicz's unique working life started as a commercial fisherman, taking him up and down the east coast for several years. He earned a degree in biology from Adelphi University, and later a Doctorate of Chiropractic Medicine from Northeast College of Health Sciences. During his studies, he met his wife—a Floridian herself—and decided he had enough of the New York climate and moved to Florida, eventually taking up residence in Palm Coast in 2007.

In 2011, he retired as a chiropractor and, like so many of our residents, focused on his creative endeavors. For Ed, it was photography. He has since published an art book with his photographs and transitioned

into being a storm chaser. He would monitor and record storms' formations and locations, then submit his photos to the Flagler County Emergencv Management and National Weather Service. Where Ed worked, as fate would have it, put him next to a senior historian for the Flagler County Historical Society (FCHS), Bill Ryan. Ed and Bill sat near each other for breakfast one day and got to talking. Before long, Bill invited Ed to join the Historical Society, and later Ed accepted the role of president.

This is a volunteer position — all the positions are — where a tremendous group of researchers work tirelessly to compile and collect facts and stories from this area. With a history that stretches back to

mastodons and massive armadillos, to the native tribes and their cultural artifacts, and the wars fought on this very soil we call home. Being the biggest repository of history, county records, and information in the county, they collect everything and categorize it all with the desired goal of education for the future generations.

"I do this for them to learn this history, a broader scope of understanding, linking it with weather.

If the storms get so bad, hopefully the community will be better prepared from learning how people survived beforehand."

Ed works with his team, all passionate about everything they accept into their archives, giving one more thread into

the bigger picture that is the history of Flagler County. All are welcome to come in and learn about genealogy, family history, potential historical sites, or just want a tour of the house.

The next extensive project on the horizon for Ed and his team is moving to a larger location. With so much history to take in, and more always on the way, they will need more room to expand. With luck, and the support of the county government, this larger building will also serve the public as a history, arts, and culture facility. This plan will continue the mission of FCHS, which is to promote historical and cultural research and education for the benefit of the community.

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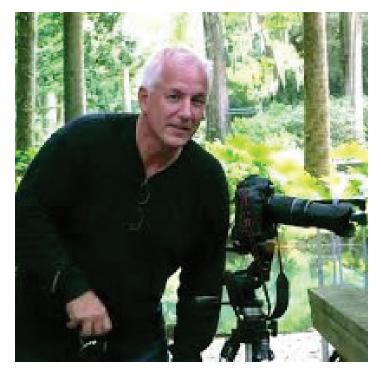


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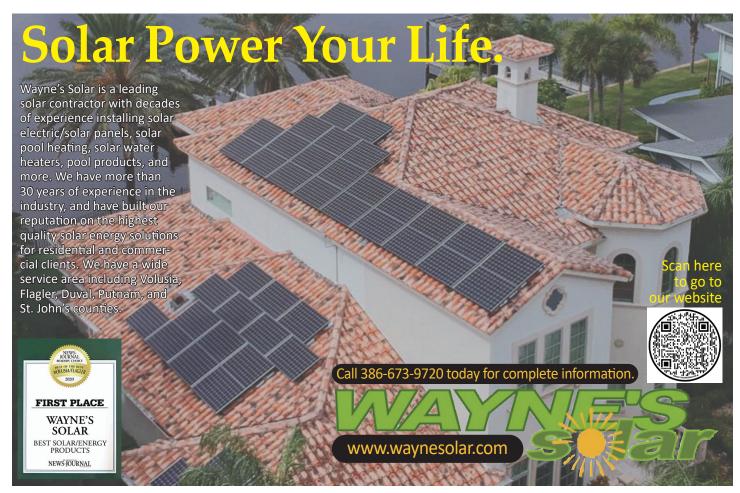

Supporting Safety at Sea: The Coast Guard Auxiliary Flotilla 44

The Coast Guard Auxiliary Flotilla 44 is a shining example of community service and maritime safety advocacy. As a nonprofit organization, it plays a crucial role in supporting the missions of the United States Coast Guard (USCG) while also providing invaluable assistance to local boaters and waterway users. Following the attack on Pearl Harbor, they obtained a charter on December 18, 1941. The USCG tasked Flotilla 44 with preserving, protecting, and defending Florida's rivers and shores as a temporary reserve unit for the rest of World War II.

Established as an all-volunteer, civilian organization, Flotilla 44 operates under the guidance of the USCG, focusing on boating safety, environmental protection, and search and rescue operations. Comprising dedicated individuals passionate about the sea and safety, the flotilla's members undergo rigorous training to ensure they are prepared for any situation they may encounter on the water.

One of the primary functions of Flotilla 44 is promoting boating safety through education and outreach programs. Members work with the local boating community: conducting safety courses, vessel safety checks, and community events to educate boaters about wearing life jackets, understanding navigation rules, and operating vessels responsibly. By imparting essential knowledge and skills, the flotilla helps reduce accidents and fatalities on the water, making recreational boating safer for everyone.

Besides education, Flotilla 44 actively takes part in search and rescue operations, working closely with the USCG to locate and assist distressed boaters.

Trained in maritime emergency response procedures, flotilla members deploy quickly and effectively to provide aid in critical situations, often serving as the first line of assistance until official rescue units arrive. Their swift action and expertise have saved countless lives

and prevented many maritime disasters.

As a nonprofit organization, Flotilla 44 does not accept money from the USCG and may not solicit donations. All of its funding comes from membership dues — which run at \$65 a year — and through their members' purchasing uniforms. Many of their members are veterans, but it is not a requirement.

The Flotilla 44 exemplifies the spirit of service and dedication to duty. As a nonprofit organization, it serves as a beacon of safety and support for boaters and waterway users, offering education, assis-

tance, and advocacy to safeguard lives and preserve the marine environment. Through the collective efforts of its volunteers and supporters, Flotilla 44 continues to make a positive impact on coastal communities and the broader maritime community, ensuring that the seas remain safe and accessible for all.

They meet at Keiser University, 1800 Business Park Blvd, in Daytona Beach, the second Saturday of every month at 9am. Guests are welcome. It is an organization that people make of it themselves. Doing service to our community and in service to our nation.

May is national Preservation Month and a good time to visit the PCHS

Each May the National Trust for Historic Preservation celebrates Preservation Month.

This year's theme is "People Saving Places" in recognition of the countless volunteers who pour their time, energy and re-



sources into protecting places and stories from the past. Two of those people are the recently retired Co-Historians Art Dycke and Elaine Studnicki.

Following City Incorporation on December 31,1999 our newly elected Mayor Jim Canfield organized the Palm Coast



Historical Society. He appointed Art Dycke and Margaret Davie as the original co-historians in April 2000. A former history teacher and adjunct professor at Daytona State College

Art volunteered until January 2024.

During his tenure Art authored two books, "Images of America: Palm Coast", "Alan Smolen: Father of Palm Coast" and over three dozen issues of of the quarterly newsletter "The Palm Coast Historian." He also narrated a 30-minute DVD that contains vintage photographs and commentary describing the early years of our founding by International Telephone and Telegraph from 1969 - 1985. It is shown in the PCHS Museum in Holland Park on Wednesday and Saturday from 1-3 PM or by appointment.

Elaine Studnicki, also a former educator, began volunteering for PCHS in 2014. She later was appointed Co-Historian in 2018 and simultaneously served a three year term as President beginning in 2020. During her tenure she initiated the wildly popular Florida Humanities Speaker series, organized over one dozen History Academy segments featuring historians and historical re-enactors, contributed numerous articles for this magazine, and shared historical information on social media.

Along with celebrating the People who save stories from the past, Preservation Month also encourages communities to save the Places that have links to the past. Recently the City of Palm Coast included "Preserve Historic Fire Station #22" on its list of Local Priorities during the 2024 State Legislative Session. Unfortunately funds were not awarded for this project.

The document noted that preserving Historic Fire Station 22 "is essential to maintaining the city's unique identity and honoring its rich history.





This historic landmark serves as a tangible link to the past, offering residents and visitors a glimpse into the early days of the community's development."

The Historical Society intends to continue advocating for the City to repurpose the building for community use as a museum or cultural center when it is no longer needed as an active fire station. PCHS agrees that it "would provide a

valuable space for educational programs and events, promoting a deeper understanding of the area's history."

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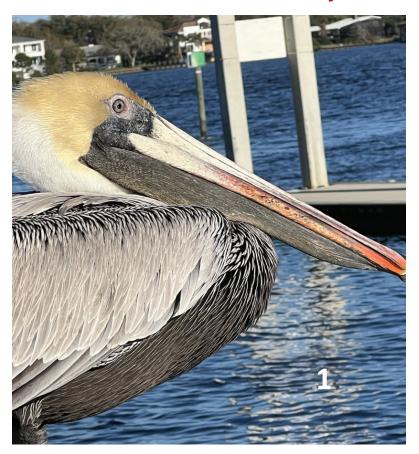
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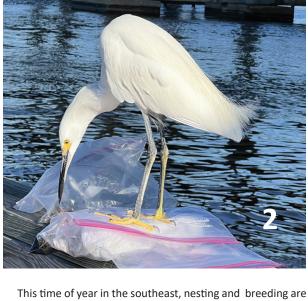

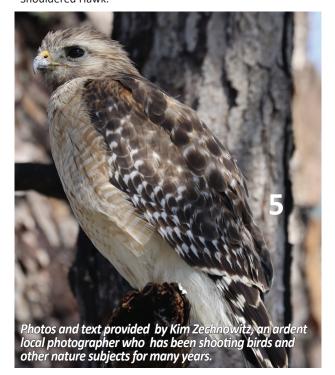

Strategies for controlling weeds, by Master Gardener Judy Jean

Weeds are a common problem for gardeners. These unwanted plants can quickly take over a garden, stealing valuable nutrients, water, and sunlight from your desirable plants. Fortunately, there are several strategies you can use to control weeds and keep your garden healthy.

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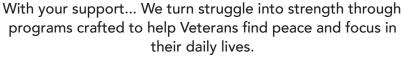

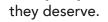

Staying in shape with a basic workout regimen. Part 2, by John Williams

Welcome to part two of our series on simplified workouts that just about anyone can do, In past month's article I mentioned that the reason for me changing my workout regimen to the current one I have is that I moved into a building with a crappy gym. It has old equipment and some that is just junk plus there's just not a lot of stuff in general.

So I changed my workout into one that didn't require a lot of equipment and I've since modified it which part of what I want to discuss this month.

First, I'm now doing four exercises instead of the three I originally started with about four months ago. I started doing some bicep curls with 25- and 20-pound dumbbells because I wasn't really working my biceps at all.

I was doing only squats, leg lifts and push ups and none of them directly worked my biworkout.

I'm not fanatical about keeping my workout time as little as possible but at the same time I don't want to spend more time than I have to for a workout especially since I work out almost every day (more on that later).

Now I mentioned that I'm not doing leg lifts anymore and this is a result of some videos I watched about chair exercises. There are a number of exercises you can do with a chair instead of traditional gym equipment. Some of these I think are worthwhile trying and there are others that I think are less helpful.

One that I now like is doing your abs while sitting on a chair. It's a really simple exercise to do as all you do is sit on the chair, hold the front edge of the seat with each hand to balance yourself and then pull your knees up towards your head (see photo at right). The



ceps. Push ups cover just about everything else in your upper body but not your biceps. So my workout is a few minutes longer but that's all. I also started doing 180 abs exercises (but not leg lifts as I'll explain) instead of 150, 120 push ups instead of 100 and 120 squats instead of 100. This also increased my workout time but only by a bit. With my 20 minutes on the treadmill I'm still under 40 minutes for the total

major advantage to this exercise, I think, is that it takes away any strain that you might feel on your lower back while doing leg lifts or any other kind of abs exercise that you do lying down, including regular situps.

I've seen a number of other exercises using chairs and you might want to check out some of there on the internet. This is the only one I use since I am only doing a small number

of exercises in the first place and chairs don't make the things I'm doing any easier or less time consuming but they may for you.

I mentioned earlier that I work out almost every day and there's a good reason for that, especially if you're trying to lose weight. I learned many years ago that when you work out your body's metabolism gets cranked up and it supposedly stays at a higher level for 24 hours after.

This means that you're burning more calories which, of course, has implications for anyone trying

to lose weight. You obviously want to burn as many calories as you can and keeping your metabolism pumped up is a good way to do that, especially since it doesn't involve any work effort.

So if you work out every day you'll keep your metabolism burning higher all the time. I don't do that myself because I take a day off after every four work out days. This means I'm doing about 24-25 workouts a month or almost 300 a year. At 68 this is enough work to keep me in good shape.

Another factor is that I've been doing this for 47 years so my body has been conditioned to exercise regularly. If you're just starting out you'll be in a much different place so what you'll probably want to do is experiment a bit to find out how much you can do while still feeling comfortable.

Now you've probably heard the saying "no pain, no gain." This is true but only to a certain extent. Too much pain is not good. It's an indication that



your body is really struggling and it could lead to injuries. You have to remember that we're not training for the Olympics, nor are we trying to catch up to Arnold Schwarzenegger.

We're just trying to stay in shape so while a certain amount of dedication is necessary, you also don't need to hurt yourself. There are some days, admittedly few and far between, when I just don't feel like working out for whatever. So I don't. I take a day off and go in the next day and do my thing. No harm, no foul.

The basic thing to remember is that you're doing this for your health so that should dictate what you do. There is a certain amount of satisfaction, I must admit, to seeing muscles enlarge and the midsection shrink, even a little, so there is that motivation also.

Whatever your motivation, though, the important thing is to start doing something as soon as you can. You'll feel better, have more energy and probably even live longer because of it.

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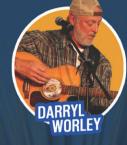




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Flagler Artists

Paul H. Beaulieu mastered multiple mediums, by James Moore

Paul H. Beaulieu, a visionary artist, is renowned for his captivating works that transcend traditional boundaries and evoke profound emotions. With a career that has spanned decades, Beaulieu has established himself as a master of multiple mediums, including painting, sculpture, and mixed media.

His distinctive style, characterized by bold colors, intricate details, and a deep sense of introspection, has earned him widespread acclaim and admiration in the art world.

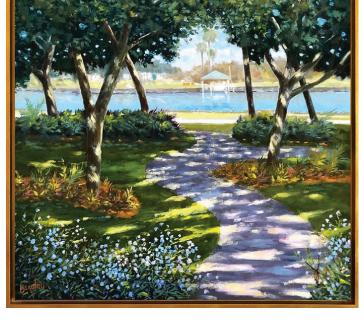
Born with an innate passion for creativity, Beaulieu's journey as an artist began at a young age.

He describes this birthplace of the Renaissance as magical, "So much art in this place, you could overdose on it." All that time, he learned the same methods as the old masters.

After graduating with some of the most unique experiences of anyone in the world, Paul co-founded an art and design firm in New England. Notable corporations employed them, such as Sealand Global Logistics, CSX Transportation, as



well as several pharmaceutical and food companies. Before selling the business in 2010, Paul served as President and Creative Director, leading over 26 employees.

What brought him down to Palm Coast was his son, who had graduated from Flagler College in 2000. Over many years, he invested in real estate across town, and moved here after selling his business. Paul wasted no time finding the local art community. "There's always a group of artists wherever you are." He then joined the Flagler County Art League (FCAL) and taught painting workshops.

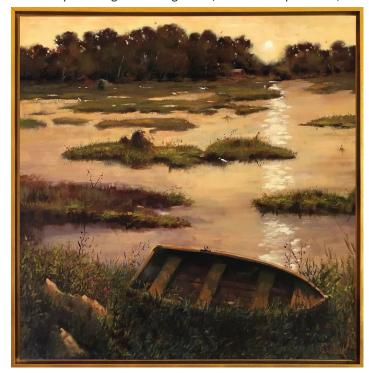
This position was another source of creativity, as he encouraged his students to paint whatever they wanted. "I would walk around the class and give little suggestions, but ultimately, it was about what they could come up with."

By sharing his knowledge and experiences with aspiring creatives, Beaulieu seeks to nurture a culture of creativity and innovation that will endure for generations to come. Sadly, COVID-19 took its toll on him, and the rest of the FCAL. While

Paul himself had enough to fall back on, the league is still trying to find its way back up.

Art has been a constant for Paul for 60 years. Starting with the oils as a teenager, or wood sculpting after his wife bought him a class for his 40 th birthday, he remains convinced there is more about art to learn and try. And this is the message he wants to convey to anyone else just starting their artistic career. Try it. Feel it. Be there.

"The big thing I hear a lot is I have a special talent; I can never do that. But the ones brave enough to start and work at it, it brings great joy to them. They will never master it but enjoy every minute struggling. Don't shoot the idea down. Special God-given talent, no, you develop a talent."

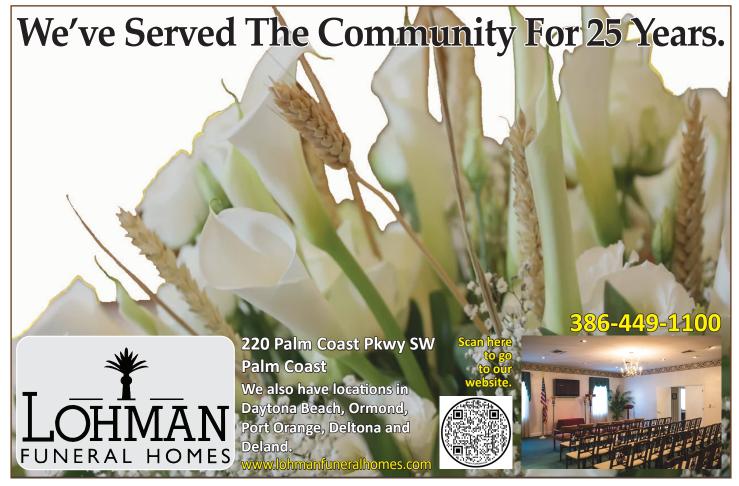
